Board of Directors Spotlight: Jerry Moore

"Always do more than what is expected."

These simple words are more than a motto for Coach Jerry Moore -- this phrase represents the true path of this man's life.

During Moore's 23-year career as Head Coach of Appalachian State University, he led the Mountaineers to the NCAA Division I-AA Football Championship in 2005, 2006 and 2007, achieving the first "three-peat" in NCAA Division I FCS/I-AA history. In 2014, Moore was inducted into the Southern Conference Hall of Fame and the College Football Hall of Fame.

These successes might have been enough for some, but Moore felt he could do more for the community. He has been an ardent supporter of the Fellowship of Christian Athletes since the 1960s. Coach and Margaret Moore are very active in their church and other local non-profits in the High Country.

They found a new purpose joining High Country Caregiver's board of directors in 2019. Margaret and Jerry volunteer to purchase and deliver Christmas gifts, lead Bible studies, and assist with any fundraisers. They pray for the success of the organization and the transformation of the children in our program.

Coach and Margaret began "Coach's Kids," a High Country Caregivers

program that sends kids to summer camp, pays for recreational sports fees, music lessons, horseback riding lessons, and any other health conscious youth activities children wish to participate in. This program gives children opportunities otherwise unavailable to them. Their vision was to give children engaging activities in a safe place. HCC provided 64 summer camp scholarships last year. Our program has grown to over 100 families and the need for these opportunities has doubled.

Coach Moore wanted to organize a golf tournament to raise money for the children of HCC. Coach and his friends in the coaching world, Scott Satterfield, Dave Doeren, Shawn Clark, Paul Johnson, Mack Brown, Oval Jaynes, and Sparky Woods are attending the first annual "Coaches Golf Tournament" benefitting the children of HCC.

HCC cannot thank Coach Moore and Margaret, their friends, generous donors, sponsors, players, Blowing Rock Country Club, and everyone helping us to give children life changing opportunities.

"We are thankful to Coach Moore and Blowing Rock Country Club for helping us raise money for the children and families in our program," Jacob Willis, Executive Director of High Country Caregivers, said.

The tournament will consist of a four-person scramble with gift certificates to the pro shop going to teams finishing first through third place in net and gross scores.

Teams will have an opportunity to meet and golf with Appalachian State University's coaching legend Jerry Moore and his coaching friends.

burden of doing so while on a fixed income. HCC steps in to help these families pay for legal fees, therapy and counseling, necessities, summer camps, after school care and activities.

Diane Bouchelle and Ella are a perfect pair it seems. Ella, now nearly a year old, squeals with laughter as her grandmother flips her in the air and tickles her making cooing noises as they play.

All in all, it's a miracle that Diane can play with her granddaughter at all. Before she was born, Ella's mother was addicted to some pretty heavy drugs. Ella was born premature and was immediately placed in the NICU for several weeks. It took the hospital a week to wean her off of the substances. Diane never left the hospital while Ella was there.

"They took notes of when her mom was there and when I was there. They couldn't believe I was there so much," Diane said. "I've been there since the beginning."

When Ella was released from the hospital, her mother was unable to care for her and she was placed with Diane on an emergency basis. "I am so lucky that HCC was there from the beginning," she said. "You guys helped me find a better apartment so she could have her own room. Marty helped me get my finances in order and even brought me a recliner so I could rock (Ella) to sleep."

Diane has been ecstatic that HCC has started having meetings in Ashe County on a regular basis again. "I hope more grandparents will come out," she said. "There's just so much camaraderie and it's so important to be able to have that. To be able to discuss the different things you are going through with your grandchild."

Through it all, Diane and Ella have been a dynamic duo, willing to take on any challenges that come their way. Ella is walking cautiously now, though she crawls at light speed most days. "We are just moving forward and doing our best," Diane said as she watched her granddaughter toddle along, giggling with delight.
